<Abstract>

Scholarship on Japan's development from the late nineteenth century to the early twentieth century has been dominated by attention given to Japan's emergence as a world power through a succession of military conflicts, and the burgeoning of a modern literary canon exemplified by such writers as *Natsume Soseki*, *Mori Ogai and Higuchi Ichiyo*.

Dr. Swale argues that the emergence of empire and high culture needs to be more thoroughly integrated with an awareness of popular culture such as *gesaku*, *rakugo* or *kōdan*, genres exhibiting often a less than whole-hearted enthusiasm for the trappings of 'civilization'. He shows that Meiji popular culture presents a rich and relatable sense of what it felt like to live and commune in urban settings as the first generation to be born without direct experience or knowledge of the Edo society that existed before the Restoration of 1868.
